On motion of Mr. Sappington, of Frederick,

Leave was granted to the Frederick County Delegation to introduce a bill entitled an Act to repeal section 81, of Article 11, of the Code of Public Local Laws, title "Frederick County," sub-title "County Commissioners," and to re-enact the same with amendments.

On motion of Mr. Walz,

Leave was granted to the Baltimore City Delegation to introduce a bill entitled an Act to repeal and re-enact with amendments sections 135 and 136, of Article 4, of the Code of Public Local Laws, title "City of Baltimore," sub-title "Carriages, Horses, Boats and Scows."

On motion of Mr. Grove, of Cecil,

Leave was granted to the Committee on Corporations to introduce a bill entitled an Act to incorporate the Elkton Electric Light and Power Company.

On motion of Mr. Haslup,

Leave was granted to the Committee on Corporations to introduce a bill entitled an Act to award the charter of the Columbia and Maryland Railway, a corporation formed under Article 23, of the Code of Public General Laws of this State, title "Corporations," sub-title "Railroad Companies."

On motion of Mr. Combs,

Leave was granted to the Committee on the Judiciary to introduce a bill entitled an Act to repeal and re enact with amendments section 160, of Article 27, of the Code of Public General Laws, title "Crimes and Punishments," sub-title "Larceny."

On motion of Mr. Franklin,

Leave was granted to the Worcester County Delegation to introduce a bill entitled an Act to provide for the appointment of new commissioners to succeed those appointed by the Act of 1878, chapter 436, for the purpose of cleaning out the Pocomoke river, and to define their duties.
