Whereupon.

It appearing that the Hon. Chas. H. Gibson had received a majority of all the votes cast (a majority of all the members to both Houses being present and voting,) the Chairman of the Joint Assembly declared that the Hon. Chas. H. Gibson having received a majority of all the votes cast (a majority of all the members elected to both Houses being present and voting,) is therefore elected Senator from the State of Marylaud to the Congress of the United States to fill the unexpired term of the Hon. Ephraim K. Wilson, deceased, whose term of office would have expired on the 4th day of March, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven.

The Chairman then declared the Joint Assembly adjourned.

The House resumed business.

Mr. Collins submitted the following message.

By the House of Delegates, January 21st, 1892.
