

108. If any of the owners of property assessed within said town shall conceive themselves aggrieved by the assessment made by said assessors, they may appeal to said burgess and commissioners, who may make such reduction in their assessments as they shall deem just and right, provided the person so aggrieved shall take such appeal within sixty days after such assessment is made, by notifying the said burgess and commissioners of said appeal. Appeal when
aggrieved.

109. The said burgess and commissioners may pass all by-laws and ordinances necessary to give effect and operation to all the powers vested in them, and the corporation may impose fines for the breach of their ordinances and recover the same in the name of said corporation before any justice of the peace of said county, in the same manner as small debts are recovered, but no such ordinance shall impose a fine for any offence exceeding ten dollars. Impose fines.

110. Said burgess and commissioners may make all such by-laws and ordinances, not contrary to law, as they may deem expedient for the protection of the health, comfort, convenience and prosperity of the town and its inhabitants, for the prevention or removal of nuisances, and suppression of vice and immorality within the town. Nuisances—
removal of.

111. If any person shall neglect or refuse to pay any fine imposed on him for a violation of any ordinance of said corporation, the burgess and commissioners may commit him to the county jail, or town lock-up, for a space of time not exceeding ten days. Burgess may
commit.

112. The burgess and commissioners may pass ordinances providing for laying out, leveling, repairing or building footways in said town, and direct the materials out of which the same may be made, and provide for collecting the costs thereof from the owners of the different lots bordering on such footways. Footways—
lay out, &c.

113. The burgess shall be treasurer of the corporation, and shall give bond thereto approved by the commissioners, or a majority of them, in the penalty of two thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful Bond.
