

day of November in any year, by shooting, trapping or otherwise kill or destroy any rabbits, he shall forfeit for every such offence the sum of five dollars. Penalty.

SEC. 2. *And be it enacted*, That no person shall in any way kill or destroy, between the fifteenth day of March and the fifteenth day of December of each year, any mink, otter or musk-rat, under a penalty of five dollars for each animal so killed. No person shall.
Penalty.

SEC. 3. *And be it enacted*, That it shall be unlawful at any time to trap quail or partridge, or to hunt for and kill or capture them between sunset and sunrise. Any person violating this section shall be subject to a fine of twenty dollars. Shall be unlawful.
Penalty.

SEC. 4. *And be it enacted*, That any land-owner may forbid the killing of birds or game on the same at any season of the year, by public notice in any newspaper published in the county, or by posting notices on the land; and any person taking or destroying birds or game on said land in defiance of said prohibition, shall be subject to the penalty of one dollar for each bird or animal so destroyed, in addition to the penalties named in sections three, four and eight. SEC. 5. *And be it enacted*, That no person shall kill any wood or summer duck between the first day of January and the tenth day of September in every year. Any person violating this section shall be subject to a fine of five dollars for each duck killed. No person shall.
Penalty.

SEC. 6. *And be it enacted*, That all justices of the peace shall have jurisdiction to hear, try and determine all cases which may arise under the provisions of this act, and upon conviction shall stand committed until the fine and fees are paid. Have jurisdiction.

SEC. 7. *And be it enacted*, That this act shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage. In force.

SEC. 8. *And be it enacted*, That all other acts inconsistent with the provisions of this act are hereby repealed. Acts inconsistent.
