

corporation, shall be appropriated to the uses thereof, in such manner as may by ordinance be directed.

How recoverable. SEC. 25. *And be it enacted,* That all fines, penalties and forfeitures under the by-laws or ordinances of the corporation shall be recovered before the president of the commissioners, or before a justice of the peace of Carroll county, upon warrant against the offender, directed to any constable of the county or of said corporation, and the said constable shall serve same under the same penalties as in cases of summons for small debts from a justice of the peace, and shall receive the same fees therefor, to be paid by the corporation.

Commit to jail. SEC. 26. *And be it enacted,* That the president of the commissioners, or any justice of the peace, when imposing any fine, penalty or forfeiture for the violation of any ordinance of said corporation, shall order the person convicted to be committed to the public jail, or an appropriate place of confinement within the corporation which the commissioners may provide, if he shall fail or refuse to pay the fine, penalty, forfeiture and costs, there to remain until the same is paid, or until discharged as hereinafter provided; and the sheriff of said county shall receive and safe keep such person according to the tenor of the commitment, and shall be entitled to his usual fees therefor, and the president of the commissioners or justice who may have directed such commitment may order any person so committed to be discharged.

Who to keep.

Enforce attendance SEC. 27. *And be it enacted,* That the president of the commissioners shall have power to issue subpoenas for witnesses, and may enforce their attendance by attachment; and the said president of the commissioners, or any justice of the peace, and the constables and witnesses shall be severally entitled to the same fees and allowances as in the recovery of small debts.

Who to commit. SEC. 28. *And be it enacted,* That the president of the commissioners, or any justice of the peace for said county, may commit to the almshouse of said county any vagrant or pauper, fortune-teller, habitual beggar, or any person that begs from house to house or from passers-by, or any person having no visible
