Mr. Robinson, from the Committee of Conference, submitted the following

REPORT:

To the Honorable the Senate:

The undersigned, members composing the Joint Conference Committee of the Senate and the House of Delegates upon the disagreeing votes of the two Houses, upon the amendments of the Senate to House Bill No. 242, being the Act providing for the general appropriations for State purposes for the year 1894, respectfully report:

That after a conference they have arrived at the following agreement, which they recommend for adoption by your Honorable Body, viz:

That the House recede from its objections to the Senate amendments to House Bill No. 242, and concur therein, with the following amendments:

Amend by striking out the word "three," in line five, of page two of the bill, and insert in lieu thereof the word "four."

And by striking out the words "twenty-four," in line six of same page, and insert in lieu thereof the words "thirty-one."
