BY THE SENATE,

January 18th, 1892.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:

We have received your message proposing that the Senate and House of Delegates shall, respectively, proceed openly at the hour of 12 o'clock, Meridian, on January 19th, 1892, in their respective Chambers, in the manner provided by title 2, chapter 1, of the Revised Statutes of the United States, by the *viva voce* vote of each member present in said Senate and House of Delegates, respectively, to name one person as a Senator in Congress from this State for the term of six years from March 4th, 1893, in succession to Hon.
