SEC. 3. And be it enacted, That the copy of the tribution here-distribution heretofore made on file in the office of the to be received clerk of the circuit court for the county aforesaid, shall be taken and received as prima facie evidence of the description and amount of the personal estate of the said Samuel to be distributed as aforesaid.

Right of appeal.

Sec. 4. And be it enacted, That any party feeling himself or herself aggrieved by the decision of the court aforesaid in the premises, may appeal as in other cases from the decision of the orphan's court.

Passed May AN ACT relating to Free Negroes in Cecil county. 5, 1853.

leave the State.

Lawful to Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall be lawful for any free negro, whilst in the employ of any white person in Cecil county, to leave the State of Maryland and return, without being subject to the penalties imposed on free negroes emigrating into this State, by the act of eighteen hundred and thirty-nine, chapter thirty-eight; Provided, that such free negro shall leave the State only for the purpose of transacting business for his white

employer, And provided, further, that it shall not be lawful for such free negro to remain out of the State
