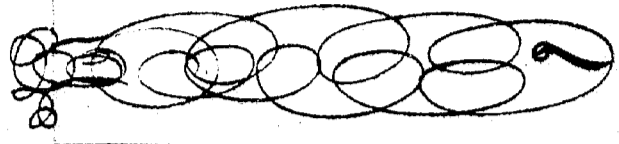


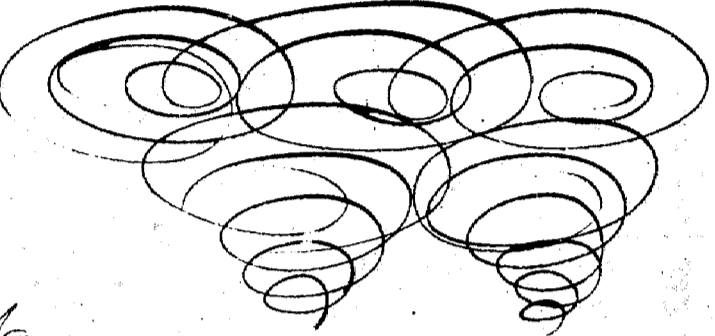

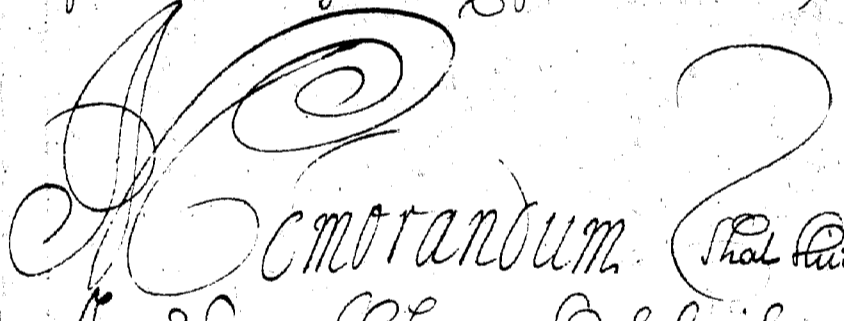

MEMORANDUM

That this day is with the 24th day of December 1691. James Dypon (before me the Subscriber) and made oath upon the holy Evangelist, that neither he nor none for him, nor any part or parcel of pay for the above forty eight shillings Sterling, save fourteen shillings which the above written Mr Galbraith assumed to pay to John. D. B. (which if paid he is willing to discontinue) also the value of One gallon runn ret'd from the said Galbraith in his life time

To the most Excellent Majesty's Justices of Somerset County. George Denson humbly sheweth. That your Petitioner through the Justification of an ill disposed person was drawn in that business relating to William Morris his Estate. For which your Majesty's were pleased not only to order me to find sureties for the good behaviour but also to find your Petitioner in the sum of five hundred pound of lawfull money at a Court holden in November last past, your Petitioner being heartily sorry for the Contempt Comitted, and well hoping it will be awarning from Comitting the like fault and also having a Considerable Charge to maintain by your Majesty's poor petitioners Only hand labour, humbly supplicates your Majesty's Labour in the premises, and that your Majesty's will please to discharge your Petitioner from his Recognizance for the behaviour and the aforesaid fine of five hundred pound of lawfull money may be remitted and as in duty bound your Petitioner shall ever pray &c.
