

Orchard and Conveniences beginning at a mark'd white oak standing near Livin Denwood to Poplar Branch from thence running half way through the swamp unto it comes to a land of my son John Jones above named. She not doing or suffering to be done any work upon any part of the same and keeping all things belonging to the plantation in good & sufficient repair for and during the term of her natural life if she so long continue we evidence it being in trust of her hands of Value of £1000 but nevertheless the same or having them to have only the lands of land according to law.

5. I give & bequeath the plantation laid wherein I now live with all houses Edifices & conveniences there unto belonging above mentioned after my wife Jane's decease marriage or refusal as above mentioned in the first place happen unto my loving son George Jones & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten for ever.

6. I give and bequeath unto my loving son Robert Jones and the heirs of his body lawfully begotten for ever the remainder of my tract of land beginning on the west side of Poplar Branch from thence running to the land of George Mitchell and so half way through the swamp intersecting his brother John Jones ab aforesaid but in case my son Robert should die without issue of his body lawfully begotten then it is my will & desire that my son George Jones do enjoy the said Part of Land in this my will mentioned to him & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten for ever and if Robert & George should both die without issue of their bodies lawfully begotten that then my son John Jones do enjoy the above said land bequeathed to him & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten for ever and that John Jones should die without issue of his body lawfully begotten then it is my will my son Robert Jones do enjoy the above mentioned plantation land & premises to him & the heirs of his body lawfully begotten for ever and I do appoint my son to be as aforesaid executor shall accomplish the age of eighteen years and that they remain and be with my wife Jane Jones until her attaining to the same age and be assistant to her.

7. I give & bequeath unto my loving wife Jane Jones my best feather bed and furniture to her use and assigns for ever;

they I give & bequeath unto my loving wife Jane Jones two negroes viz Dom and Deborah with their future increase for and during the course of her natural life and after her death I give & bequeath the said negroes Dom & Deborah with their increase to be equally divided betwixt my two sons George Jones & Robert Jones to be executors & assigns for ever.

8. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Margaret Jones one negro girl to her her use & assigns and assigns for ever.

9. I give & bequeath unto my godson William Hayman one young Cowe with her future increase to him to be spent & assigned for ever to be delivered when this my will shall be proved.

10. I give & bequeath the remainder of my personal estate money plate Jewells Goods Chattels & Household stuff to be equally divided betwixt my loving wife Jane Jones my two sons George Jones and Robert Jones and my daughter Elizabeth Jones provided always this gift to my wife Jane Jones to stand if she doth not meddle or concern herself with any of my lands more than what before by this my will is ordered & appointed.

11. Lastly It is my will and desire that my loving wife Jane Jones be whole & perpetuity of this my last will and testament and I do desire my loving Brother George Mitchell and my loving Brother George Bett overseers to be doing in the true execution in what is here mentioned in this my last will in witness whereof I have written with my hand & sealed this fifteenth day of August one thousand six hundred eighty & nine /
