Robert Douse late of this County... your petitioner as in duty bound shall ever pray &c.

Robert Douse Debit 1686. May 29 to 2 galls of 19th Brandy... 27

18th July 1688. See the contents of that Bill to Mr. Justice Jervis or order, by my Order.

Robert Jervis made oath that the said Douse promised him payment of the above 276 pounds but he is not to receive any part thereof. Order then was granted as the dem. for 276 pounds of tobacco at 20s.

To the Hon^{ble} Justice of Somerset County. The humble petition of Michael Holland... your petitioner shall as in duty bound.

The above petition being read was granted & ordered that sd Holland do make the New Road two or three feet wide passable for horse & foot.

John Drown in Open Court acknowledged himself to be indebted to the said Mathews in the sum of ten pounds sterling money due to be levied on his goods & chattels.

The condition of the above recognizance is that if he do not appear before our Justice in Court sitting tomorrow being the 10th of August to answer the complaint of Capt. Henry Smith then the recognizance void otherwise to be & remain in full force & virtue.

Thomas Northington of recognizance in Open Court acknowledged himself to be indebted to the said Mathews in the sum of ten pounds sterling money of England due to be levied on his goods & chattels.

The condition of the above recognizance is that if he do not appear before our Justice in Court sitting tomorrow being the 10th of August to answer the complaint of Capt. Henry Smith then the recognizance void otherwise to be & remain in full power force & virtue.

Ordered that a Grand Jury be summoned.

James Weatherly being this day committed into the Sheriff's custody, was same day brought into Court and was found for being drunk and for swearing out oaths at Court & elsewhere at Andover: Wiltshire. Ordered by Court that sd Weatherly give security for his future behaviour & good. Whereupon came the said Weatherly & his security Andover: Wiltshire and the said Weatherly did acknowledge himself to be indebted to the said Mathews in the sum of ten pounds sterling money of England due to be levied on his goods & chattels.
