Upon the said Stephens says with his security which he gave and the said says did acknowledge and now says himself to be indebted to our Sovereign Lord King & Queen William & Mary of England the sum of twenty pounds sterling money of England and the said says the sum of five pounds the money due to be paid on their goods and Chattels Lands and Tenements for their Masters use &c.

Condition of which recognizance is such that if the aforesaid bound Stephens says do pay the two finds for swearing verily when lawfully demanded of God awarded, as also of the good behavior & observance to all their Masters Lices people of the Province during the Courts pleasure without recognizance to be void of force and other ways to be remain in full power force and virtue.

Wm. Layton this day was sworn in Court on behalf of their Masters and sent up to the Grand Jury.

To the Writ in Court sitting the 10<sup>th</sup> of September. in Samuel Hopkin and in James Rouse did agree with the Petitioner to take a displaced Boy into my house promising me on the behalf of the Court that he should be paid after the rate of two thousand pounds of tobacco per year, as also for a new pair of stockings which he provided with a pair of new shoes for the said Boy according to the present made with in Hopkin and Rouse both which they promised should be done against which I humbly crave according to their promise and of the honor as before shall ever pray &c. Thomas Moris. The shoes cost 60. The stockings 60. The Boy came to my house the 21<sup>st</sup> of September last & dyed the second day of the following his name was Alexander Hummer.

The aforesaid Petition being read the Court Orderd that Thomas Moris be paid proportionably according to the present out of next County Levy. (viz) 787 pounds of tobacco as pray'd &c.
