

“upon an order of the County Commissioners,” and further, “that nothing in the provisions of this Act shall be construed to be compulsory upon the County Commissioners to levy said full rate of 30 cents, but may be less if so determined and decided by the said County Commissioners.”

Which was adopted.

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Also favorably,

House bill, File No. 634, entitled “An Act to repeal sections 176, 176, (or 176 B) 178 B and 178 D of Article 2 of the Code of Public Local Laws, title “Anne Arundel County,” subtitle ‘Justices of the Peace and Constables,’ as the same was enacted by sections 176, 176 (176 B) of chapter 334 of the Acts of 1892, section 178 B of chapter 276 of the Acts of 1900, section 178 B of chapter 467 of the Acts of 1902, and section 178 D of chapter 301 of the Acts of 1894 and to re enact said sections with amendments and to add new sections to said Article 2, to be designated as ‘Sections 176, 176 B, 178 D and 178 E.’ ”

Which was read the second time and ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

Mr. Wells, from Select Committee, reported favorably,

House bill, File No. —, entitled “An Act to repeal and re-enact with amendments, sections 6, 7, 10, 11 and 18 of chapter 105 of the Acts of 1898, relating to the sale of spirituous and fermented liquors in the town of Laurel, Prince George’s county.”
