The Secretary of the Senate appeared and delivered the following message:

We respectfully propose with the concurrence of your Honorable Body, that all bills, and leaves to introduce bills, to sanction bequests, devises, sales, gifts or conveyances to religious or charitable objects, be referred to the Committee on Judicial Proceedings and the Committee on the Judiciary, of the respective Houses, and that said committees be and they are hereby instructed to report on March 11, 1904, a general bill embracing all such bills and leaves, except where there is a special reason for more speedy action, in which case seperate bills may be introduced.
