If this bill becomes a law it will prevent the Court of Appeals from passing upon the question of the validity of the grant to Mr. Schreiber, and will make that grant binding by Legislative enactment.

I think it wrong, except under extraordinary circumstances, for the Legislature to pass laws to affect special cases pending in the Courts. It should be left to the Court to decide the controversies before them, without Legislative interference.

If this bill should become a law, it would be a bad precedent and would be against a sound public policy.
