the most prominent, respected and useful citizens of this State has departed this life after a long and useful career; and

Whereas, This House desires to record its appreciation of his many excellent and sterling qualities, his patriotism and his usefulness as a citizen, and to express the most profound regret at his sudden demise.

Therefore, be it resolved, by the House of Delegates, that in the death of Mr. Hurst, this Commonwealth has suffered the loss of one of its most upright and honored citizens, the example of whose life and character is worthy of emulation.

Be it further resolved, That an engrossed copy hereof be forwarded by the Chief Clerk of this House to the bereaved family.

Be it also further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be entered on the Journal.
