Said bill was then read the first time, and ordered to be printed.

Senate bill entitled an Act to prohibit the shooting of wild fowl from sink-boats and floating blinds within two miles, west, south by east of the shore of that part of Hooper's Island, south of the lower ferry, known as "Lower Hooper's Island Ferry,"

Was read the third time, and passed by yeas and nays, as follows:
