Second. *Resolved*, That, in common with the law-abiding citizens throughout our city and State, we rely upon the integrity and fidelity to their high trust of the Senators' and Delegates to the General Assembly, for the prompt rejection of any such bill, and bill tending to impair the efficiency of our Sunday Laws.

Third. *Resolved*, That the President of this meeting appoint a Committee of as many citizens as he may deem proper, and that the President be requested to act as Chairman of said Committee, to go to Annapolis, and to cause a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolutions, signed by the President and Secretary of this meeting, to be presented to the House of Delegates and to the Senate, and that a copy thereof, signed as aforesaid, be furnished to the press of this city for publication.
