two thousand dollars, made by the will of said deceased, to his wife, Ann Griffith, who died before her husband without heirs.

Endorsed, "Passed by yeas and nays."

The bill entitled an Act to repeal the Act, passed at the January Session, 1874, chapter 278, entitled an Act to regulate fences on adjoining lands of persons in Prince George's county.

Endorsed, "Passed by yeas and nays."
