Mr. Gwynn presented the petition of Frank Tolson and 30 others, asking for an Act to change the binding lines between the 6th and 12th Election Districts of Prince George's county.

Which was read and referred to the Prince George delegation.

Mr. Smith presented the petition of James C. Cullim and 43 citizens of Baltimore county, asking the repeal of the law exempting one hundred dollars from attachment.

Which was read and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Mr. Browning presented the petition of William Browning, D. H. Friend, and 116 other citizens of Garrett county, asking for the passage of a law to prevent stock of non-residents from running at large in said county.

Which was read and referred to Messrs. Browning, Barnard and Sprigg.

The Secretary of the Senate returned the following bills:

The bill entitled an Act to empower the Clerk of the County Commissioners for Talbot county, to administer an oath or affirmation to any account, to any person presenting a claim to the Commissioners against the county.

Endorsed, "Passed by yeas and nays."

The bill entitled an Act authorizing the Clerk of the Circuit Court for Anne Arundel County to place certain fees in the hands of the several Sheriffs of this State, and the City of Baltimore.

Endorsed, "Passed by yeas and nays."

Also, delivered,

A bill entitled an Act to repeal Section 8, of chapter 506, of the Acts of 1874, entitled an Act for the taxation of dogs in the State of Maryland, and to re-enact the same with an amendment.

Which was read a first time and referred to the Committee on Agriculture.
