The message, as amended, was then read, assented to, and sent to the Senate.

The Secretary of the Senate delivered the following mes-

sage:

OUT FROM THE MENTS.

January 14th, 1876.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates.

We have received your message in regard to the election of State Treasurer, and have ramed on the part of the Senate as tellers to count the ballots and report the result, Messers. Walsh and Steiner.

Messrs. Barnes Compton and Geo. C. Merrick have been put in nomination on the part of the Senate.

Which was read.

The hour of one o'clock, P. M., having arrived, the House proceeded to the election of a State Treasurer, to supply the place of Hon. Barnes Compton the present State Treasurer, when it appeared that 73 ballots had been cast on the part of the House of Delegates.

The Speaker then sealed the box, and delivered the same into the hands of Mestrs. Constable and Naill, tellers on the part of the House, who proceeded to the Schate Chamber to join those who had been appointed on the part of the Senate, for the purpose of counting the ballots.

After an absence of twenty minutes, the tellers on the part of the House to count the ballots for State Treasurer, appeared, and through Mr. Constable, Chairman, submitted the following

Of which number Barnes Compton received 65 votes, and George C. Merrick 32 votes, and there were two blank ballots.
