Leave was granted to the Committee on Inspections to introduce a bill to repeal Section 15 of chapter 153 of the Act of 1872, entitled an Act to provide for the inspection of steam boilers in the city of Baltimore.

Leave was granted to the Baltimore County delegation to introduce a bill entitled an Act, providing for the repeal of Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, chapter 473, of the Public Local Laws of Baltimore county, entitled "Auctioneer."

Leave was granted to the Committee on Corporations to introduce a bill to amend the charter of the Worcester Railroad Company and its supplements.
