Ordered, That it is the opinion of the House of Delegates of Maryland, that a long continuance in the Executive departments of power or trust is dangerous to liberty; a rotation, therefore, in these departments, is one of the best securities of permanent freedom, and it is the opinion of the House, that no person shall hold at the same time more than one office of profit created by the Constitution or laws of this State, and that this opinion be entered upon the Journal of this House.
