In the matter of the contested election of the Senator from Calvert county, your Committee respectfully report, that from a full and tair examination of the testimony adduced before them, that at the election held on the 2nd day of November, 1875, that it appeared by the returns made to the Governor of the State, that Nathaniel Duke received one thousand and forty-six votes, and Joseph A. Wilson received one thousand and forty-one votes, being a majority of five votes for Nathaniel Duke, the sitting member.
