manner waved his opinion upon the propriety of taxing mortgages; but because the basis of taxation had been greatly enlarged in this bill to the great advantages of the tax-payers of the State, and in his judgment if taxing mortgages was inserted in the bill, it would, as the two Houses are now constituted, result in the defeat of the whole meassure greatly to the injury of the people of the State.

Pending its consideration,

Mr. Aydelotte submitted the following amendment:

AMENDMENT PROPOSED.

After the word "Phelps" add "and seventeen other Senators."

Which was rejected.

The question recurring upon the adoption of the order. It was adopted.

Mr. Lloyd submitted the following message:

BY THE SENATE,

April 1st, 1876.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates:

We have after consideration now concurred in the amendment of the House, to Senate bill, (printed 114.) entitled an Act to create a loan to discharge the indebtedness of the Maryland Hospital, and respectfully request the House to recede therefrom.
