one-half of the fine and forfeitures to go to the former, the remainder to be paid to the School Commissioners of Dorchester county, to be applied to the maintenance of the public schools in said county.

Sale of forfeited property.

Right of appeal.

SEC. 4. *And be it enacted*, That the justice of the peace making the condemnation under this act shall give at least ten days' notice in writing or by hand-bill, posted in the most conspicuous places in the neighborhood, not less than three places, as to the time, place and terms of sale of said condemned and forfeited property, which terms shall be cash, and the right of appeal from the decision of the justice of the peace, in all cases, is reserved to the defendant to the Circuit Court, and provided that unless the defendant shall give good and sufficient bond or security for his appearance at the next term of court, and to pay all fines and costs that may be imposed upon him, he shall stand committed to jail till said fines and costs are paid, or until the Circuit Court, upon appeal, shall reverse the judgment or sentence of the said justice of the peace.

When effective.

SEC. 5. *And be it enacted*, That this act shall take effect six months from the date of its passage.

Chapter 234.

AN ACT to authorize the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to remove, by purchase or condemnation, Foley's wharf, situated at the mouth of the harbor of said city.

Authority to purchase.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, for the purpose of improving the navigation of its harbor, may agree with the owner or owners of Foley's wharf, situated on the east side of the mouth of the main harbor, adjoining the property of the United States light house establishment, for the purchase of so much of the said wharf or pier as extends beyond the pier-head line laid down by
