are debaters' points.

DR. MICHENER: They basically provide a different philosophy on the two different systems. In this case, your point is valid.

MRS. FREEDLANDER: Mr. Chairman, isn't it true that the unicameral legislation also was accompanied by reference to the legislative council, which might have improved the law with fewer loopholes?

DR. MICHENER: They came in simultaneously and the question is, and it has been argued, how much is due to unicameralism, as such, and how much is due to the legislative council. This is mentioned, by the way --

MRS. FREEDLANDER: Yes.

THE CHAIRMAN: And of a nonpartisan nature; that's another thing. It's very difficult to cancel it out. I think that is a point well taken.

DR. MICHENER: Then the other argument made against the second chamber is that there is no need for review. The argument for review dates back historically to when we didn't have legislative councils; that we have bills drafted by legislators and by the executive department
