MR. CASE: There are things that could 1 broadly be said. I suppose, that would be for the 2 public schools that are not subject to this prohibi-3 tion because of various attorney generals' rulings. which we discussed last time; but I would think your 5 salary, for example, which is not a part of this could 6 be interpreted to be "for the public schools." You are certainly speaking for the public 8 9 schools here this morning and you are being paid for it. So, I'm wondering whether or not --10 DR. SENSENBAUGH: That angle has never been 11 12 pulled. MR. CASE: I am wondering whether or not 13 you and these members of your department would have any 14 objection to a rewording of this section, if it could 15 be done, to accurately describe just what is being done 16 now and protect the procedure that we have now? 17 DR. SENSENBAUCH: I believe, in reading 18 over Mr. Raver's statement, his printed statement, I 19 presume there was a lot said in addition to the state-20
