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as to what type of role you see for the lobbyist.

The other problem, of course, with the lobbyist is that with a unicameral legislature, the legislators are clearly responsible for what they do and the claim is made that with the publicity and the open procedures you get from a unicameral legislature, the lobbyist's role is exposed and so his role is thereby reduced. There again are assertions that have been made both ways. Some people look at it and say it is not just the way at the present time.

On Page 9, there is the reference to the fact that one of the arguments against unicameralism is that it is strange and it is unknown. It is pointed out that unicameral legislatures are very common in city governments. People are quite familiar with them. They are quite familiar with a comparable system in corporations, where you don't have a bicameral director at the top and that is no longer something that is strange to the American people.

THE CHAIRMAN: I might add that we are also familiar with the transition from a bicameral local legislative body to a unicameral. We in Baltimore changed in
