since 1900, I am the fourth person who occupies the

State Superintendency. Now, there may be something

said about having too long a tenure, this is possible,

but I assure you, I won't be in office as long as my

predecessor or the past two, because time gives out on

me and mandatory retirement age catches up. So, this

vill not happen.

I think, in these states where you have a turnover of the superintendency, you also have a turnover of the central staff which is really very detrimental. I visited a state department of education just as recently as this spring. I spent three days with it as a reviewing team and I shuttered to think what is going to happen after the next election. I know what happened after the last election and, for me, I would not work in a situation like that.

MRS. BOTHE: On the subject of the superintendent of schools and the manner of his selection, of course, our Constitution is silent on that subject altogether and we have heard some sentiment expressed that there should be a constitutional provision
