DR. SENSENBAUGH: If all the fifty states 1 had the strong central system of education, the central 2 control that Maryland has, I don't think there would 3 be any of this argument about bypassing state governments; but, really, some of the state departments 5 across the country are rather pathetic. 6 7 MRS. FREEDLANDER: I just mentioned that because I wondered whether any of you wanted to talk 8 about that, because I read it. Did you want to speak 9 on that? 10 11 DR. EARHART: No. I can only concur with what he said. 12 13

DR. SENSENBAUGH: There are some very strong departments of education. New York State is one of the strongest and there are quite a few, maybe twenty of them, in fairly good shape, possibly more. Half of them, let's say, but them some of them are weak and I am sure if I sat over in Washington and was thinking about parsoning out the money to be administered locally through the state departments of education, you would want to put some pretty stringent controls

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
