THE CHAIRMAN: Gentlemen, if we can come 1 to order, please. This is a hearing by the Committee on 2 State Finance and Taxation of the Maryland Constitutional 3 Convention Commission. We are here today to discuss Article 3, 5 Section 36 of the Maryland Constitution, which provides 6 as follows: No lottery grant shall ever hereafter be 7 authorized by the General Assembly. 8 This particular provision of the Constitution 9 10 found its way into our basic law in the Constitution of 11 1851 and has remained in its present form unchanged through 12 the successive drafts of 1864 and 1867. The anti-lottery provision has a rather interesting history but we are 13 14 not going to take our time this afternoon to go into all of it. Suffice it to say that one time in this state 15 the lottery was rather well known and often used method 16 17 of raising revenue. It was taken out of the law in 1851 because it was felt that there were various problems that 18 were caused by the existence of a lottery which the state 19

would be better served not to have to face.
