that democracy has failed. The attempt to avoid the responsibility of our obligations by resorting to the immoral means of a lottery is not far from attempting to avoid responsibility by taking dope to live in a dream world for a while. In both cases, there will be a rude awakening.

'We are now in the process of abolishing the entrenched evil of slot machines. Why would we open the flood gate of crime in a lottery?"

THE CHAIRMAN: Do you care to add to that, Mr. Mills, in any way?

MR. MILLS: Only that our group, the Committee which comprise the Division of Christian Social Relations in the Diocese, feel very strongly about this next to the last paragraph. That is that a government that cannot be supported by the people governed is admitting that democracy has failed. Then I think this is a good point. It is somewhat difficult to consider a complete revitalization of our fiscal policies in this state and it is very easy to take the onus off us by advocating a lottery. But basically the church's
