MR. DELIA: I would like to make one comment on what the Chairman pointed out. One of these people may want to elaborate on it.

of these ideas again and perhaps deal with some new ones.

The difference between the operation on a local level and the state level, I think, is based primarily on

the fact the City Council in Baltimore meets every week, so that they have a chance to bring back legislation if there happens to be something in error or if the people haven't voiced their opinions as they think they should have. In the Maryland General Assembly, unless they change the procedure, they meet for seventy consecutive days and, with the flood of bills going through, which most of the time the people are not aware of the type of legislation that is being proposed and you have to do a terrific educational job of getting them to watch everything that went through the legislature, to be aware whether it is going to affect them beneficially or adversely.

I think, based on this, this is one of the reasons why they cannot operate the same as they do on the city level. If they have something like Pennsylvania, or

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
