and having the same jurisdiction as the general court,
what would be the difficulty in creating within that
court a division to handle probate matters? Wouldn't
that in effect be the same thing except for a name as
the Orphans Court today except with broader powers and
so forth?

JUDGE FRIEDMAN: Again I can't argue with you or any of the Commission as to the set-up. I say being the Chief Judge, I am proud of what the court is doing today. But to lift it up and equal to the Supreme Bench or any raising of the caliber or anything else, of the court, I am for it a hundred per cent.

You got to realize in testamentary law, especially in Baltimore City, probate law, we are busier in the summer than in the winter. The members of big law firms understand this because most of their lawyers are trying cases in the winter in the Supreme Bench and Federal courts and when it comes to the summertime, they are cleaning up their estate work. Since I have been Chief Judge, we have as many hearings as lawyers want, formal or informal, in the summertime.
