and the legislature in Nebraska at the present time is more than adequate for the purposes of coming to grips with public questions. If you like, we can explore this later,

if you have some questions about it.

There are questions involving the problem of a governor elected on a partisan ticket and the legislature elected on a nonpartisan ticket. So, if you are interested in those, we can go into that later on.

Another point which was mentioned in the paper, on Page 13, I believe, was the fact that unicameralism results in higher standards for the introduction of bills.

It should be pointed out that the number of bills which a legislature must consider, I think, is a function of several things. One would be the length of the session. It is possible that it would be a function of the number of legislators. Nebraska's experience in this field, however, is, I think, largely the result of a relatively severe limitation on the introduction of bills after a certain number of legislative days. In other words, after a certain point has been reached in the legislative session, an individual member may no
