MR. KENTNER: Yes.

MR. SCANLAN: And if you could have a unicameral legislature with multi-member districts, you would have the same problem of knowing more than one.

MR. KENTNER: This could be true.

DR. WINSLOW: Except that the tendency in unicameralism is to have a smaller numeral total of legislators.

MR. SCANLAN: You wouldn't have a senate.

DR. WINSLOW: And the house in Nebraska has

been reduced in size. So, instead of having -- what is it -- 142, we have in Nebraska 43, which makes the difference in the total number of districts we have to have or

the total number of people in an elective district. If you divided Maryland up into 43 districts, you would have a different situation.

MR. SCANLAN: We could do it very simply.

Let's have a 42-member Senate and eliminate the House of Delegates.

DR. WINSLOW: I go along with that.
