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 political theory was one of restraining government, that is, we were fearful of government; government was not to be trusted, government was not to be active. It was to carry out police functions and leave everything else alone.

Now, we are in an era of very active government. We are demanding a great deal of government. If we are interested in a very strong and viable Federal system, then, in effect, we've got to figure out ways in which states can play a more important role and we've got to think of structuring our political institutions in a way that states can play this role.

Throughout American history there has been a problem of balanced constitutionalism against democracy. Constitutionalism means essentially placing restraints upon government and, in a democratic system, it means placing restraints upon the majority. So, we fashioned a number of things; separation of powers, the bicameral legislature, judicial review, all of these things to, in effect, restrict the majority.

So, the question arises, how many restraints do we want to place upon the majority? How effectively
