MR. WINTERS: Well, in the vast majority of instances they have been, and that is properly so. And it has even been so, universally true, that there have been charges that there is no substance to the non-competitive election, that it has been, as they say, freezing them in office. Well, that is not true, because there have been a couple of instances in which a judge who came up that way was not reelected. It is enough to prove that it can work, that it is not a mere empty gesture and yet not enough to interfere with the

practice.
