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MR. CORY: Mr. Winters, do you have any problem in Missouri or do they have any problem in Missouri getting good qualified lawyers to go on the bench for a short period of six years?

MR. WINTERS: Well, they did before they had this tenure provision, because there was no assurance that someone would not come along and take the office away from them. But with the assurance of tenure by non-competitive election, they do not have that problem, and good lawyers do take judicial office.

MR. CORY: Well, is it possible that if they finish the tenure of six years, that some other lawyer could go to a nominating commission and ask that he be put on the ballot?

MR. WINTERS: No, that could not be done.

MR. CORY: That cannot be done?

MR. WINTERS: The only way that the man can get on, is if the voters would reject the man who is in office, then the commission would have the duty of nominating someone to take his place.

MR. CORY: It would have to be a special
