the constitution?

Ą.

MR. WINTERS: Well, I suppose it could be done either way. I would be afraid if it were left to statute that there might be some tampering with it sometime under pressure. I think it would be safer to have it in the constitution.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Winters, do you have any fixed ideas as to whether or not the lawyers should outnumber the laymen on the commission or should it be an equal number or does it really make any difference, as long as you have a fair representation of both groups?

MR. WINTERS: Well, I think I would be inclined to say yes to all of those. I think that it probably would not make much difference in the effect, but from a public relations standpoint, I think there is strong reason for having the laymen at least equal to the lawyers, and I would say --

THE CHAIRMAN: Does that include the judge as in the lawyer group?

MR. WINTERS: Well, no. You cannot have it exactly, because it is desirable to have an odd number
