of people on this thing in order to avoid any possibility 1 of a stalemate. But the experience, the public relations 2 experience in that one Denver instance in which the lay-3 men do outnumber the lawyers has been good. And I 4 repeat, I feel strongly that this is an important place 5 for the non-lawyer to serve. The courts are not a 6 place primarily for lawyers and judges to hold forth, any more than schools are for principals and hospitals 8 are for doctors and nurses. Hospitals are for patients, 9 schools are for the pupils, courts are for the litigents, 10 the businessmen and the citizens who appear. And the 11 laymen on the nominating commission gives them a chance 12 to have their say in the people who preside over these 13 courts. And I think that is good, and I think that it 14 is proper. 15 MRS. BOTHE: We ought to have at least one 16 convicted criminal. 17 THE CHAIRMAN: Well, are you saying then that, 18 for example, in the seven-man commission, that there 10 should be at least three laymen, three lawyers with the 20

judge as the chairman of the nominating committee?
