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20 21 Finally, and I assume this will be up for discussion today; I only this morning had a chance to look at Article 3, Section 52, which I gather has been pretty much a bulwark of public education. This is the section of the State Constitution which has to do with the whole business of the funding or support, financial support for public schools.

The impression that I get, and I concede it is only an impression, is that this section of the State document has functioned well and my inclination is if it is working, let's leave it alone. Thank you very much.

THE CHAIRLADY: Thank you, Dr. Paquin. Dr. Pullen, can we put you back on the hot seat?

DR. PULLEN: Yes, ma'am. I am used to this.

THE CHAIRLADY: Dr. Bard is very anxious to ask you a question or make a comment.

DR. BARD: I would like to ask a question.

Dr. Pullen, since you are now in higher education, I would like to ask you whether you believe that there ought to be a statement dealing with higher education within the Constitution itself? There are a goodly
