DR. PULLEN: No, no. I beg your pardon.

That is this amendment -- that is this provision in the Constitution that does not permit him to do that. That is what we don't want you to change.

MRS. FREEDIANDER: But the provision in the Constitution states very succinctly that the General Assembly, and even Article 3 is a legislative article; so that under the existing Constitution, the legislature really has a great deal to say. Article 8 says the General Assembly shall by law -- it doesn't say the Governor shall by law.

DR. PULLEN: That is, neither the legislature nor the Governor can change the estimate for public education unless they do one thing; unless the legislature changes the law. You see, it is saying that there is no manipulation of the money for the children. Here is where schools suffer, now, unless you have the political power to put it over. They suffer when it comes to physical facilities and colleges and universities and the like. It all depends upon the opinion and attitude of two or three people.
