as well qualified as anybody else and he can't go because
I have no money to pay the fees imposed by that group,
and yet I pay taxes.

Now, I don't know whether it is constitutional

or not, but in my book, it isn't. Logically, at least.

It may be, legally, but I don't believe that as a process
as a matter of governmental function, that any child

ought to be denied that right.

DR.PULLEN: I'd go just as far as the State goes for one child as with another. That is a matter of policy.

MR. ENEY: How far would you go?

MR. ENEY: You said you would put in the Constitution a guarantee that every child regardless of his circumstances would be entitled to education in college. Did you mean education through college? Did you mean that in the sense that a child, regardless of his capacity, mental capacity would be entitled to a college education or the attempt to get one in the same manner as a child is in grammar school, for instance?

DR. PULLEN: No, I'm using the word in a
