the college level, even though it is not at the grammar school level?

DR. PULLEN: I think we are getting into two or three different points. The question is what do you mean by mental capacities? What do you mean by standards Standards are being changed constantly by colleges, as to admission, but I'm saying that you cannot deny, you cannot take one student that you consider qualified and turn down another one who is qualified because he cannot pay for it.

Now, I am not raising the question as to whether the institution should set standards or not. Of course, I think colleges have gone pretty wild on that.

MR. ENEY: What you mean is this, to be specific, Dr. Pullen; in public school education, as I understand it, every child is entitled to go to school, whether he has the same capacity or much less capacity than his neighbor. This is a matter of no concern. He is entitled to get whatever he can get out of public education.

Colleges don't apply that rule and some are
