the public as a whole. I think undoubtedly in Maryland 1 and across this country, looks to the board of the 2 particular institution as being the responsible party 3 for the success or failure of the institution and yet. by a gradual process of executive development in this 5 State, the legislative committees, the actual governing 6 of that institution can gradually pass out of the hands 7 of the governing board. B This is the particular item I wanted to 9 present to the Committee. I would be pleased to answer 10 any questions. 11 THE CHAIRLADY: Would you be in a position 12 to submit to us proposed language covering the existence 13 of the State university in the Constitution? 14 15

DR. KUHN: We'd be very pleased to do that,
Madam Chairlady, and I would say a brief position paper
of how the Board of Regents itself feels on this; perhaps
simple suggestive language and copies of pertinent information. There have been fine studies on this subject.
One was headed by Dr. Eisenhower, of Johns Hopkins, a

very fine publication. I believe this type of thing
