in no way ever talk against autonomy or any segment of education because I believe when it is properly used, it can be a real force towards efficiency in any segment. Now, the historic development, it seems to me, as I have watched here in Maryland for a brief year, it would appear, but I've watched it a long time, or across the nation, has been one in which academic freedom per se is very rarely attacked any more, not by direct route.

I think that the fine development across the nation as a whole is that in almost every state the selection in almost every segment of higher education, the investigation of the faculty members is now left to the board and the institution involved. I think this is so much a part of our existence today that no one would really ever take it away. I think we have the other tremendous safeguard and that is if in any governmental unit or any individual attempted to take away in your institution, in any junior college, in any four-year college, in any university, real academic freedom, that institution would cease to be accredited within a period of twelve to fifteen months and, when it ceased to be
