a way that it will cover all of the institutions of higher education, I think it would be a distinct advantage to these institutions.

MR. ENEY: I wasn't thinking solely of academic freedom, in the sense of freedom to speak your mind, but rather, of control of administrative matters, curriculum, in one sense; in other words, are you suggesting or do you suggest that the University of Maryland Board of Regents have a constitutional autonomy in all matters in the administration, going all the way from academic freedom to the tiniest of administration detail?

DR. KUHN: Yes, I am, in this sense, that no institution would ever want to be free of complete post-audits by State-appointed auditors and people of that type who completely delve into everything that has been done; but these should be post and not pre; and in pre-audit, you can control all aspects, pre-auditing of expenditures, pre-auditing of the hiring of people, pre-auditing of the individual salary. This is where there is real danger.
