MR. ENEY: Would you suggest that that constitutional autonomy be so extensive as to grant to the administration of the university or the regents the power to be as selective as they might at any time choose in the admission of students, or would the fact there is a University of Maryland make it necessary that the power be not quite that extensive?

DR. KUHN: Actually, the expectations of the people who have been elected in recent years in the legislature and the Governor and the people of Maryland have placed already by custom the authority to set the standards for admission of students and, while it has been certainly a matter of public concern and great debate, it has not been seriously questioned in recent years and I believe, actually -- Dr. Bard, you could speak on this from another point of view, but I believe this is an area that fortunately, by the opinion of enlightened people of all the citizenry has moved over to control the boards and I think this has happened.

Now, the University of Maryland has not attempted to be terribly selective. I mean, move way up
